#### **HOW THIS PROJECT CAME TO BE**

In 2001 the poster "100 Unitarians and Universalists Who Made a Difference" was purchased at General Assembly, brought back and lovingly framed by a couple who were long term members of the church. It was a beautiful gift to the Unitarian Universalist Church of Akron congregation.

In 2017 we hung our first Black Lives Matter banner out front and in our sanctuary. In 2018 we started looking at adopting the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle. This meant we were going to examine how we do things, how it impacts people on the margins of the dominant culture. Part of this process required us to look around at what we already consider the norm. What we assumed couldn't be any different because that is how it always has been. What we overlook because it blended in with the status quo. As we were growing into our anti-racist work, we started to take a look at the poster that was hanging in our entryway. 97 of those featured on the poster were white and 75% were male. Was this one of those things we overlooked because it had been there so long? In 2019 we decided to remove the poster from our entryway and consider how it might be different.

In May of 2020, the Unitarian Universalists Church of Akron adopted the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle and the research began. What you see here is the result of that research. There is so much more out there than is captured in this poster. We hope for you, this poster is not the end of the inquiry, but a launching pad into further exploration.

#### **NAVIGATING THE PROJECT**

On the poster itself you will find a picture, a few descriptive words and birth and death years. This supplement will provide you with some insight into the decision-making process for the changes. Narrowing it down to a couple words for each person on the poster does not do justice to the contributions made. So, a link to additional biographical information is also included.

### **DEMOGRAPHICS**

Through the work of our 8<sup>th</sup> Principle Transformation Committee we took a look at the demographics of the old poster. Unitarian Universalism is considered a "white" denomination. We knew we wanted the updated poster to better reflect the diverse and cross-cultural influences that exist in our history.

**The Original Poster** "100 Unitarians & Universalists who made a difference...." was printed by Uni Unique and sold at the UUA's InSpirit Bookstore years ago. The poster contained 99 names "+you" to equal that 100.

#### **CHOOSING WHOM TO INCLUDE IN THE REVISION**

Our first step was to confirm that all those on the original poster were actually Unitarians and/or Universalists. Much to our surprise, many listed never truly became a UU. Those from the original poster that we chose not to include in this revision are listed in several categories.

**Adjacent:** Their work and points of view greatly align with UU philosophy, and we claim them as our own even if they never officially became a UU. Transcendentalists, transformational social justice reformers and humanitarians among them.

**Cannot Confirm:** These are folks who are claimed on many lists of "famous UU's" but the biographical information we found does not come close to supporting that claim.

**Removed for Cause\*:** Several on the list, although clearly identified as Unitarian Universalist were removed because of their willing participation in egregious acts against humanity... slavery, exploitation.

\*Note: If we were to remove all of those on the poster who expressed racism, misogyny or homophobia at one point or another, this would be a very small poster indeed. We are an imperfect people. Those remaining on the poster were chosen based on the contribution they made in moving our society, our country, our denomination forward for the better despite the flaws they carried.

#### **CHOOSING WHOM TO ADD TO THE REVISION**

Research through the Meadville Lombard Sankofa Project, BLUU, UU Rainbow History helped guide us to those initially not considered for the poster, perhaps because of their race or gender identity, yet they made significant contributions to Unitarian Universalism and/or the world at large. Often looking to confirm one name would lead us to others. The long overdue recognition of prolific black authors has become essential scholarship for those doing anti-racist work, thus leading us to more historical representation as well as laying the groundwork for future representation.

We did not necessarily have to stick with just 100 names, as there are many more that could be included. We look forward to the next reiteration of this poster. We have already started a list! Perhaps there is even a series of posters in our future grouping folks together by time period or profession or contribution.

<sup>\*</sup>The number of LGBTQIA+ folk on both versions of the poster is only as accurate as historical information depicts. It is more than likely several others are from the community but were not identified as such in their biographic materials.
